



What is Laudato Si?

According to CAFOD.org.uk:

"The encyclical Laudato Si' is considered part of the Catholic Social Teaching tradition. Although there are many previous statements by popes and bishops on the question of our place in creation, this is the first social encyclical in the Catholic Church to address the complex social and ecological crisis in a direct and specific way.

Laudato Si' complements what the Catechism of the Catholic Church says, which is that our responsibility is to care for our world and not 'steal' resources from future generations."







Introduction



In the words of this beautiful canticle, Saint Francis of Assisi reminds us that our common home is like a sister with whom we share our life and a beautiful mother who opens her arms to embrace us. "Praise be to you, my Lord, through our Sister, Mother Earth, who sustains and governs us, and who produces various fruit with coloured flowers and herbs"



Chapter 1 - What's Happening in Our Common Home

Within Chapter 1 of the landmark encyclical, Pope Francis identifies modern ecological issues that we must urgently address:

- Pollution and Climate Change
- The Issue of Water
- The Loss of Biodiversity
- Decline in the Quality of Human Life and the Breakdown of Society
- Global Inequality



Chapter 1 - Key Quotes


"The violence present in our hearts, wounded by sin, is also reflected in the symptoms of sickness evident in the soil, in the water, in the air and in all forms of life. This is why the earth herself, burdened and laid waste, is among the most abandoned and maltreated of our poor; she "groans in travail" (Rom 8:22). We have forgotten that we ourselves are dust of the earth (cf. Gen 2:7)."

"The climate is a common good, belonging to all and meant for all" and recognizes that "a number of scientific studies indicate that most global warming in recent decades is due to the great concentration of greenhouse gases (carbon dioxide, methane, nitrogen oxides and others) released mainly as a result of human activity".



Chapter 1 - Key Quotes

"The destruction of the human environment is extremely serious, not only because God has entrusted the world to us men and women, but because human life is itself a gift which must be defended from various forms of debasement. Every effort to protect and improve our world entails profound changes in "lifestyles, models of production and consumption, and the established structures of power which today govern societies". Authentic human development has a moral character. It presumes full respect for the human person, but it must also be concerned for the world around us



harm "is caused by sin understood as broken relationships "with God, with our neighbour and with the earth itself" (§66). These relationships are broken in part because humans "presum[e] to take the place of God and refus[e] to acknowledge our creaturely limitations" - a dynamic that causes us to mistake God's command for humans to "have dominion" over creation (Genesis 1:28) as an exploitative license rather than a vocation to "cultivate and care for" God's good gift of creation (Genesis 2:15)".

Chapter 2 - Key Quotes

Humans are uniquely created and called to exercise responsible stewardship over creation on behalf of the loving Creator (67-68).

All creation is a mystery the diversity and unity of which both reflect and mediate the Creator (76-92).

"[T]he destiny of all creation is bound up with the mystery of Christ" (99).

Chapter 3 - The Human Roots of the Ecological Crisis

In this chapter Pope Francis acknowledges the human roots of this ecological crisis:

- Criticizes "anthropocentrism,", the belief that humans are radically separate from and above the non-human natural world (115-118).
- The Holy Father notes that anthropocentrism devalues creation and leads to "practical relativism", which values creation only to the extent that it is useful to humans (118, 122).

Chapter 3 - The Human Roots of the Ecological Crisis

Pope Francis goes on to note that:

- "By itself the market cannot guarantee integral human development and social inclusion" and must be regulated when it fails to protect and promote the common good (Ibid.)."
- Pope Francis emphasizes the interconnectedness of all creation and, as such, connects care for creation to the protection of human life and dignity -- especially regarding abortion, the poor, those with disabilities and testing on "living human embryos" (117, 120, 137).



Chapter 4 - Internal Ecology

"It cannot be emphasized enough how everything [in creation] is interconnected" (138). He notes that this is true of all creation of which humanity is a part, in addition to the various aspects of human life: academics, economics, health, governance, culture and every part of "daily life" (139-155).

Pope Francis re-emphasizes that care for creation is intimately connected to the promotion of a preferential option for the poor since those with the least are most harmed by ecological degradation (158).

But the international community has still not reached adequate agreements about the responsibility for paying the costs of this energy transition." (165)

"Poor countries should aim to eliminate extreme poverty, reduce corruption, and should recognise that some of their privileged countrymen scandalously overconsume."



Chapter 6 - Ecological Education and Spirituality

Pope Francis calls on each of us to take action now!

- Personal conversion is needed, he "invites persons toward lifestyles animated by sound ecological virtues, i.e., 'good habits,' that must be developed in persons by both secular and faith communities (202-215)"
- He recommends, "consumer movements" like boycotts "prove successful in changing the way businesses operate, forcing them to consider their environmental footprint and their patterns of production"(206)

Chapter 6 - Ecological Education and Spirituality

- "Ecological Education" is fundamental and must take place everywhere in society - "at school, in families, in the media, in catechesis ... political institutions and various other social groups ... [and all] Christian communities" (213- 214).
- The Sacraments and the Sabbath are essential to right relationship with creation (233-237).
















Creator of heaven and earth and all that is in them, You created us in your own image and made us stewards of all your creation.


